

It is a celebration of tradition and testimony to the power of story-telling and instilling wisdom in the hearts of all those who witness this timeless spectacle.





#### **RAMLEELA - AN ANCIENT TRADITION**

"RAM"-The first thought that comes to everyone's mind is that about "Sri Ram-The Ideal Man".

The Hindu God Rama often called Ram, Ramachandra and Sriram. Sri Rama was born to Kausalya and Dasharatha in Ayodhya, the capital of the Kingdom of Kosala. His siblings were Lakshmana, Bharata, and Shatrugna. He married Mata Sita, daughter of King Janaka.

Sri Ram is the seventh and one of the most popular avatars of Vishnu. In Rama-centric traditions of Hinduism, he is considered the supreme being. Rama symbolizes a model of reason, right action and desirable values. Rama and Krishna (also an incarnation of Vishnu) were the two most-popular recipients of adoration from the bhakti (devotional) groups that swept the country during that time. Whereas, Krishna is adored for his mischievous pranks and amorous dalliances, Rama is conceived as a model of reason, right action, and desirable virtues. In sculpture, Rama is represented as a standing figure, holding an arrow in his right hand and a bow in his left. Rama's birth on Earth was to kill Ravana, who had kidnapped his wife Sita.

Ramleela is a big part of the Hindu culture in the Indian cities of Ayodhya, Varanasi, Vrindavan in Uttar Pradesh, Almora in Uttarakhand, Satna in Madhya Pradesh and Madhubani in Bihar. But, it is not only confined to these parts of India but also foreign countries.

Ramleela recalls the battle between Ram and Ravana. And it consists of a series of dialogues between Gods, sages and the faithful. Ramleela's dramatic force stems from the succession of icons representing the climax of each scene. The audience is invited to sing and take part in the narration. Ramleela or play is any dramatic folk re-enactment of the life of Rama according to the ancient Hindu epic Ramayana or secondary literature based on it, such as the Ramcharitmanas. It particularly refers to the thousands of the Hindu God Rama-related dramatic plays and dance events that are staged during the annual autumn festival of Navaratri in India. After the enactment of the legendary war between good and evil, the Ramleela celebrations climax in the Vijayadashami (Dussehra) night festivities where the giant grotesque effigies of evil such as of the rakshasa (demon) Ravana are burnt, typically with fireworks.

Ramleela is likely an ancient tradition of India, because it is generally accepted by scholars that written manuscripts emerged later in Indian religions, and ancient texts were largely a product of oral tradition. There are many versions of the story of Ram, but the story that is told in many Ramleelas, plus or minus some scenes, is fairly consistent and begins long before Ram's birth in the kingdom of Ayodhya. Two back stories entailing twists of fate and curses uttered in rage are often presented to set up the main plot. In the first one, a young Dashratha slays the virtuous and dutiful son Shravankumar in a hunting accident, prompting the latter's blind father to proclaim that, the king too will one day be separated from his son and die bereft.

In the second back story, the overly confident sage Narada discovers that Lord Vishnu has "made a monkey out of him" to bring him down a few spiritual notches, leading him to declare that Vishnu too will one day lose his beloved and have to rely on the aid of monkeys to recover her.

## THE ESSENCE OF RAMLEELA

Ramayana is one of the important epics of India, which depicts the journey of lord Rama, traditionally ascribed to Maharishi Valmiki. Lord Vishnu, also known as "God of preservation" has always incarnated as human to fight against evil and revive dharma on earth. In Treta Yug, in order to empower good against evil and restore dharma, lord Vishnu incarnated as lord Rama which was his seventh avatar. In the epic Ramayana, Maharishi Valmiki has exquisitely portrayed the divine presence of lord Rama,

#### Meaning:

Sri Rama is a great intellectual, adherent to rules, eloquent, handsome, destroyer of foes, broad-shouldered, strong-armed having conch-shaped neck and prominent cheeks.

Possessing a broad chest, armed with a great bow, with fleshy collar bones, a noble head, a graceful forehead and great prowess.

Mighty and powerful, with well-proportioned body, neither tall nor short, shining complexion, large eyes, lustrous body and good qualities.

Pious, firm in his vows, he is ever intent on doing good to his subjects. He is illustrious, wise, and pure at heart. He is obedient to elders or accessible to the needy and ever meditating on the means of protecting those who take refuge in him.

The mightiest lord Rama, at the age of 16 begins to tear down many demons with the companionship of his brother Lakshmana and guidance of sage Vishwamitra. After the defeat over demons, lord Rama attended Sita's swayamavar in Janakpur, and won by lifting the bow, which couldn't be lifted by the ordinary. When the newly wed Rama and Sita return Ayodhya, Dasharatha, the king of Ayodhya, becomes overwhelmed and decides to crown him as his successor. But, Kaikeyi, the second wife of Dasharatha, who was initially happy gets influenced by Manthara, the cunning maid servant and demands Rama to be exiled for 14 years, with his crown passed on to Kaikeyi's son Bharata.

Rama and his wife Sita accompanied by his brother Lakshmana disciplined themselves to the rules of exile. During their exile, Sita's attention was grabbed by a golden deer, who was Maricha and she asks Rama to get it for her. Rama leaves the ashram to fulfill his wife's wish, leaving Sita under Lakshmana's protection. When Rama strikes the arrow against the deer it falls and imitates Lakshmana's voice and scares Sita about her husband's danger, due to which she sends Lakshmana to protect his brother from danger and meanwhile Sita gets abducted by Ravana, disguised as poor Brahmin beggar.

Sita, was then imprisoned in Ashoka vatika, in Lanka ruled by Ravana. Later with the help of Vanar sena, who built a bridge to cross the river into Lanka, Rama was able to rescue Sita. Later Sita testifies her purity by stepping into Agni, called Agnipariksha.

After the completion of their exile, they return to Ayodhya, and this bought joy to the people and they welcomed him with diya's lighted all over Ayodhya. The return of Rama to Ayodhya was celebrated with his coronation called Ramapattabhisheka, from then on Rama's return to Ayodhya is celebrated as Deepavali/Diwali called as "festival of lights", which signifies the victory of good over evil.

On this auspicious day, a religious act called Ram Leela is enacted vividly as a play all over India, to portray the life story of lord Rama mainly emphasizing the defeat of Ravana by lord Rama, signifying the defeat of evil and empowerment of good. This act not only tells the victory of good over evil but is also very much relevant to modern times:

- It teaches us to respect our elders and consider our parents as likely to God i.e., Mathru devo bhava
   Pithru devo bhava.
- The depth of brotherhood between lord Rama, Bharata, Lakshmana, Shatrughna can be seen in all situations. Even though Rama's throne was taken away immediately, the bond between the brothers stayed the same and didn't fall apart over materialistic desires.
- It tells us being truthful and righteous is the highest degree of dharma. Just to get a moment of attention we might lie but truth holds lifetime respect even though it seems hard to hold on.
- The relationship between mother, father, brother, wife and many others in Ramayana was filled with love, loyalty, honesty. In modern times we don't give much importance to any kind of relationships but this epic helps us understand the values of relationships.
- It helps us understand that every person has a purpose in our life, with ourselves as protagonists.
   Like hanuman, Shabari, Jatayu (vulture) each had their own purpose, either for a small or a large task
- It conveys that unity is the greatest strength. If Vanar sena weren't there it would have taken much time that we could imagine to save Sita.
- Lord Rama, teaches us that how good relationship with the society matters. He was there for needy
  people, and that good karma reflected on him.
- Out of all very importantly our thoughts and desires are our biggest enemy, we need to know how
  to control them. Ravana was a versatile, devoted, and a knowledgeable person, but when he lost
  control over his desires, it leaded to the destruction of his kingdom. On the other hand, Rama who
  was selfless and righteous made him divine and even now remains immortal in his acts of
  protecting dharma.

The re-enactment of one of the historic events i.e., Ramayana through Ramleela reminds us the subtle values of life, which stands as a route map for very individual existing.

"No matter how wise and intelligent a person is like Ravana. If he is devoid of dharma, then destruction is certain. Good always prevails over evil"






#### SHRI RAM-THE SUPREME GOD
